### **The Family of John Wilkerson McCollum Dykes**

John Wilkerson Dykes~born 17 June 1857 in Tarlton, Warren Co., Tn.

John married Nancy Jane Morton prior to June or July 1883. (Nancy Morton was the daughter of the Rev. John J. Morton and Mary Adaline Smith Morton.) Nancy Morton Dykes was born 25 Dec. 1865 and died 20 Apr. 1957 in Coalmont, Grundy Co., Tn.

John and Nancy's children were:

1: Mary Sue Dykes, born 29 Dec., 1883 in Grundy Co., Tn. and died 3 Mar. 1884 and is buried in the Philadelphia Cemetery, located in Grundy Co., Tn.

2: Anna Belle Dykes, born 11 Mar. 1885 in Grundy Co., Tn. and died 2 Sept. 1936 in Coalmont, Grundy Co., Tn. Anna Belle married David Murphy Griswold on 24 Apr., 1904 by W.K. Irvin, M.G., in Coalmont, Grundy Co., Tn.

3: Rosa Bee Dykes, married John B. Stephens and do not find them listed again in the Grundy County census. Rosa B. died 17 Nov. 1922 and unknown where she is buried. Do not know if Rosa and John had children.

3: Daisy Gustava Dykes, born 2 July 1895 and died 25 June, 1951 in Coalmont, Grundy Co, Tn. Daisy never married. \* A memory I have of Aunt Daisy, "Always on Christmas, my Momma had Granny Dykes and Daisy as guest. Momma served home made wine and Seagram's 7 mixed drinks. Aunt Daisy took Momma's drink and poured wine in it and hid from Granny Dykes, so she wouldn't know she was drinking." "Of course, Daisy got a little high and started giggling and Granny kept asking her what was so funny? This caused Daisy to giggle more." Momma was having a hard time not to break up and start giggling too, but she finally had to let go." Poor Granny Dykes never figured out what all the fuss was about." I hope I never lose the wonderful memories I have of Granny Dykes.

When I took my, to be first husband, to meet Granny Dykes, she interrogated him as to who his parents were, where did he work, how much money he made, etc., etc. I was so embarrassed at first, then I started laughing at the look on his face!!!

5: Louise Beth Dykes, b: 12 June 1901 and died 11 June 1978 in Monteagle, Franklin Co., Tn. Aunt "Weeze" married William Herbert Ross and they had nine children: Herbert Conrad, Norma Louise, John Carroll, Lew Allen, Beverly Ann, Joseph Morton "Joe", Eugene Wesley, Julia Elmyra "Judy" and her twin James Rudolph "Rudy" Ross.

Louisa's sister, Nancy Wilkerson Dykes married the brother of Herbert Ross.

6: Nancy Wilkerson Ross, b: 17 Apr. 1907 in Coalmont, Tn. and d: 19 Mar 1964 in Coalmont, Grundy Co., Tn. She married Albert P. Ross and they had 7 children: Albert Larry, Iris Christine, John Jacob, Rosemary, Bettye Janice, Jerry Ivan and Nancy Carole Ross.

Note: The parents of Wm. Herbert and Albert P. Ross were John William Ross and Mary Jane Smith.

David Murphy Griswold was the son of George Gilbert Griswold and Martha J. "Mattie" Bennett. He married Anna Belle Dykes on 24 April, 1904 by W.K. Irvin, M.G. (Minister of the Gospel), in Coalmont, Grundy Co., Tn. Of this marriage there were five children.

1: Maretta Ellene Griswold, b:7 Oct. 1907 in Coalmont, Grundy Co., Tn. Ellene died on 30 June 1921 in Hartford, Sebastian Co., Arkansas, possibly of Typhoid Fever. Her body was shipped back to Tennessee by train and during the shipment her body was lost, but eventually was found. Ellen is buried in the Altamont City Cemetery, Altamont, Grundy Co., Tn.

2: David "Dave" Winfred Griswold was born 2 Aug. 1914 in Hartford, Sebastian Co., Arkansas and died 10 July 1996 in Winchester, Franklin Co., Tn. Dave served in the U.S. Army for 30 years, one of the places he served was in Germany during WWII and obtained the rank of Sergeant even though he only had one eye. As a child wearing a long dress, he was playing with his Mother's scissors and caught them in his dress and pulled them and they struck his eye. Dave also served in Korea, he was a cook in most of his time in service. Dave retired from the service of country with the rank of Master Sergeant.

Dave was married three times: 1: Orene Mills, who had been married before and had two girls, Dave loved these girls as if they were his own. Orene and Dave divorced. Then Dave married Wilma Schnider. Wilma had a stroke and died in Colorado Springs, Co. and is buried in the National Cemetery located in Denver, Co. Dave and Wilma had no children.

After Wilma died it was several years before he remarried to his 3<sup>rd</sup> wife, Mildred "Millie" Silverton. Millie had a son by a previous marriage but she and Dave had no children. After Dave died Millie stayed in Monteagle, Tn. until her health failed her and she moved to Hawaii to be near her son, and she died and is buried there.

*Nancy Jane Morton was born December 25, 1865, the child of The Rev. John J. Morton (b. Jan. 10, 1829; d. March 16, 1905) and Mary Adaline Smith Morton (b. Jan. 10, 1833; d. July 22, 1909). The family lived in Tarlton Valley, where John Morton held church services in their home. He later founded the First Methodist Church in Tarlton, where he, his wife, and his children are now buried. **Women of Grundy County: Nancy Jane Morton Dykes (con't)****Memories of Grannie Dykes**

After the death of her husband, Nancy Jane Dykes (Grannie Dykes) was left to raise three children. She ran three boarding houses, one in Coalmont called "The Wigwam", one in Tracy City at the Stepp Place, and then later, the "Big Onion" in Coalmont. Boarders were travelling salesmen, miners, and railroaders. One man boarded at the Big Onion for over seven years.

I have many fond childhood memories of the Big Onion. The Big Onion was huge, with five bedrooms but no bathrooms. The home was heated by fireplaces in the living room, downstairs bedroom, dining room, and by a woodburning stove in the kitchen. The Home Comfort Stove had a warming oven and a reservoir to keep water hot. Grannie Dykes would take an "eye" off, put a big iron kettle down in the hole, and cook the most wonderful foods--dried beans with ham hocks, green beans with little new potatoes and maybe several pods of new okra or yellow squash cooked on top of the beans. Grannie always had a bowl of sliced onions on the table for her midday meal; I asked Willie Mae (Curtis) Mullican if that was the reason Grannie's boarding house was called The Big Onion--"Well, of course!"

I remember that big old house with the stairs just made for sliding down. There was a finial at the end that kept you from sliding off. Under the stairs, Grannie kept apples wrapped in paper to last her all winter. I suppose there were other foods stored there, but I only remember the apples and canning jars full of vegetables, berries, and other fruits. Grannie had a cow, chickens and pigs. She bought fresh beef from meat vendors who came by wagon each Saturday. We'd have steak for breakfast the following Sunday morning. In November when it was hog killing time we had tenderloin with biscuits and milk gravy ...no knowledge then of cholesterol or fat being bad for you! It must not have made any difference back then; all the Mortons lived to be in their nineties! Grannie lived to be 93. Her children were not so fortunate; most died of cancer and only Aunt Weeze (Louise Dykes Ross) lived to be 70.

I can remember some of the meals we had at Grannie's house--big bowls of mashed or fried potatoes, homemade pickles, pepper relish and chowchow, cornbread or biscuits, beans, fried round steak, ham or chicken fried or stewed with dumplings. Several of Grannie's granddaughters and great grand-daughters still make chicken and homemade dumplings. My sister Bernice Gross is noted for her chicken and dumplings, as is Ann Brazelton's daughter Sharon. Sharon always brings a big pot of chicken and dumplings to the Ross Reunion. Janice Ross Oliver says, "You'd better get in line early to get some!"

Other foods we have tried to duplicate are Grannie's apple cobbler, apple stack cake and fried apple pies. Bernice recently made a stack cake from dried apples Esther Hembree had given her, and after tasting it we all said, "That just about does it!", a saying handed down from Pib Campbell. But that's another story!

A big pantry held all the dishes Grannie used when the boarders gathered to eat. A lot of those dishes eventually ended up under the back steps! It was Grannie's daughter Daisy's job to carry the dishes from the dining room to the kitchen for washing. If Daisy carried too many at a time and they crashed, she would pick up the pieces, go out the back door, and shove the broken dishes up under the steps of the house. Apparently Grannie had so many dishes that she never noticed the loss!

Some of our best times at Grannie's house were with Bill Sparkman, a boarder who played the piano. He could play almost any song from memory, and we would gather around the piano and sing. When Bill didn't play, Aunt Weeze or Mama would, although my mother was trained to play the organ. Aunt Weeze played the piano beautifully.

Granddaughter Ann once said, "Grannie Dykes was my idol." Except for short periods, none of Grannie's children lived with her after their marriages, but all lived nearby. Our mothers were busy with babies and household chores, and Grannie just took us all under her wing. I cannot remember her ever scolding or fussing at me, although I am sure she did. She was a strong-willed woman, very outspoken, with powerful beliefs about what she thought was right. She thought you should go to church, pay your bills, save your money, obey your parents and elders without question, and work for what you got. In fact, Grannie Dykes was the idol of all her grandchildren.
